

Courageous Research: Asking Bold Questions to Confront Social and Educational Inequity

Dr. Maira Martelo is a community activator, disruptor, and change agent, who grew up in Cartagena, Colombia and has more than a decade of teaching experience as a college professor in Colombia, Mexico, and the United States. She worked as a research consultant in Colombia and Mexico, evaluating programs that involved community engagement. She has lived in Jacksonville, FL for more than 18 years, getting to know the Hispanic community through her work as a contributing writer for Hola Noticias, the local Hispanic newspaper, and her engagement in several Hispanic organizations.

Dr. Martelo has ties with MSERA as a presenter during her doctoral program (Educational Leadership) at the University of North Florida and as an author for Research in the Schools. Her dissertation research on early literacy practices at home and beliefs about education among the Hispanic community led to the creation of the first bilingual Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten Program in Jacksonville. She is a strong advocate for public education and community service, partnering with diverse non-profit/corporate business entities, faith-based partners, entrepreneurs, advocacy groups, arts organizations and individuals representing diverse populations to participate in research-sharing, amplification, and other education advocacy initiatives.


